Pat Hapgood: Eternal Tides- The Voyage of a Lifetime

Following my recent talk and photo presentation about our family's incredible sailing adventure, I've received many questions from friends eager to learn more about our journey. To provide a clearer picture of our experience, I've decided to share a brief account of our remarkable voyage aboard the *Melissa II*

Voyage of the Melissa II

On July 2, 1979, my husband, our two young daughters, and I set sail from Whitby, Ontario, embarking on a three-year sailing adventure. By the journey's end in August 1982, we had covered 26,000 nautical miles, eventually arriving in Victoria, our new home.

Our voyage took us through the Caribbean, across the North Atlantic to the Azores, and onward to England. We navigated the canals of France, sailed the Mediterranean, and explored Spain, Italy, Gibraltar, and the Canary Islands. Continuing down the northwest coast of Africa, we crossed the Atlantic once more, visiting the West Indies before sailing across the Caribbean to Panama. From there, we passed through the Panama Canal into the Pacific Ocean, journeying up the coasts of Central America, Mexico, and the U.S. West Coast until we reached our final destination: Victoria.

The Journey

We sailed out of the St. Lawrence River, making our first stop in Prince Edward Island to visit friends. From there, we continued down the Atlantic Coast to North Carolina before heading to the Virgin Islands, where we spent our first winter adjusting to life at sea.

The journey through the infamous Bermuda Triangle was not without its perils. About 400 miles out, a violent storm swept down upon us. With all sails down and a thousand feet of line dragging behind to slow the vessel, we were still making five knots. For the next thirty sleepless hours, we battled relentless gale-force winds. The ferocity of the storm shredded our jib, and the strain pushed Melissa II to her limits, leaving her with cracked ribs. And I must admit, the storm pushed our family to our limits as well. But somehow, through sheer determination, we made it through the three-day ordeal, repairing the torn sails and mending the boat's wounds before pressing on.

The second winter was spent cruising the tranquil, turquoise waters of the Bahamas. But the call of the open ocean soon lured us onward. We sailed across the Atlantic to Bermuda, then on to the Azores, and eventually to Britain. That crossing, completed in 36 days, was nothing short of eventful. Blinding rain squalls, high winds, frigid weather, illness, and even a particularly aggressive whale ensured the journey was never dull.

But there were breathtaking moments as well: graceful porpoises leaping alongside the boat, sea turtles gliding past, schools of flying fish breaking the surface, and giant tuna slicing through the depths. We saw whales, sharks, and even passing freighters that altered course just to exchange friendly greetings with us.

Once in England, we toured its storied sites before crossing the English Channel to France. Our journey down the French canals began at Le Havre, where we lowered the mast and navigated the intricate waterways ourselves. As we moved south, the locks grew larger, reminiscent of the Panama Canal itself. For months, we meandered through picturesque towns, charming villages, and bustling cities, covering 1,000 miles before finally reaching the Mediterranean.

But our timing was off. Winter was approaching, and with it, fierce storms. Nevertheless, we pressed on, visiting Italy, Monaco, Spain, and Gibraltar, waiting out the winter months in Spain until spring's warmer embrace allowed us to continue.

From there, we ventured down the African coast to Casablanca, then to the Canary Islands, where we spent several weeks preparing for another Atlantic crossing. In March 1982, we arrived in Tobago, our spirits lifted by the familiarity of the Caribbean.

We enjoyed a period of "holidaying" in the Caribbean before making our way to Panama. Our passage through the Gulf of Mexico was cautious and tense. We traveled in a convoy with an Australian vessel returning home, offering mutual protection against the threat of modern-day pirates that still lurked in those waters.

On May 17th, Melissa II passed through the Panama Canal and into the Pacific. From there, we sailed up the coast past Costa Rica and Mexico. The final legs of our journey took us to San Diego, where we cleared customs, before finally reaching Victoria. To my relief, we were greeted by people eager to hear our story, which soon made its way to television and radio.

Looking back, it was an extraordinary adventure. At times, nerve-racking and exhausting—days spent wondering if the relentless winds would ever calm, nights spent praying for still seas. But the rewards were just as numerous: the magnificent places we visited, the warmth and kindness of people from all walks of life, and the strength we discovered within ourselves.

Through it all, our daughters never faltered in their studies, thanks to their dedication and the Ontario Department of Education, which provided everything they needed to keep up with their schooling while at sea.

People often ask if I would do the trip again. My answer? "No comment."

I hope this note answers many of the questions I couldn't cover in my presentation.
