




Jan 17: The Way (2010) . Comedy/Drama

The Bear Trail: How a Canadian Bear Became Winnie-the-Pooh

The past couple of months have been a whirlwind. Between sleepless nights, new routines, and the sheer joy of welcoming our little princess into the family, finding time to sit down and think- let alone write- felt almost impossible. Life has been happily rejigged, with everything now revolving around her tiny fingers, soft cries, and endless cuddles.

As my wife and I talked about how we want to raise her, one surprisingly thoughtful point came from our son, Ronan. He suggested that we try to keep her away from TV screens, mobile phones, and tablets- at least early on- so she doesn't become dependent on electronic devices and can begin talking sooner. It made us pause. He had a point.

After all, we grew up without these constant screens. I still remember when our family finally bought a television- and that only happened after the 1992 Cricket World Cup in Australia. I suspect my dad knew exactly what he was doing, given how much I loved the game. Television back then felt special. Programs were something you *looked forward to*, not something that was always on. In this current age though it makes me wonder is the programs that are available for kids good for their growth?

Some of my favourites were *Giant Robot*, and of course the classic cartoons that seem almost forgotten today - *Tom and Jerry*, *Bugs Bunny*, *Mickey and Minnie Mouse*, and many others. But one character stands out in particular, and that's the inspiration behind this article: Winnie- the- Pooh. Now that's the twist, we're not going to talk about the ill effects for The Television on Youngs Minds but lets talk about the impact a little Canadian Bear had on young minds back then and continues to impact young minds even now.

I loved Winnie-the-Pooh because she was simple, gentle, and always willing to help her friends- though easily distracted by her love for honey. Over time, I've developed a habit of wanting to understand the *stories behind the stories*: where characters come from, why they exist, and what makes them endure. Perhaps that curiosity has grown alongside today's world of misinformation and social media. It feels important to know what's real.

So, who exactly is Winnie- the- Pooh? And did you know she has a Canadian connection?

Believe it or not, Winnie- the- Pooh was inspired by a real bear who once lived at the London Zoo- and she got there thanks to a Canadian soldier and veterinarian named Harry Colebourn.

The story begins in White River, Ontario, in 1914. While waiting at a train station, Harry bought a black bear cub for \$20. He named her Winnipeg Bear, after his hometown- "Winnie" for short. Harry was on his way to Quebec to join fellow soldiers heading overseas for World War I, and Winnie went with him.

When Harry and his unit sailed to England, Winnie was right there on the ship. She quickly became a beloved pet and unofficial mascot of the Second Canadian Infantry Brigade while they trained on Salisbury Plain. When the brigade was later ordered to France, Harry couldn't take Winnie with him. Instead, she was temporarily loaned to the London Zoo- a decision that would quietly change history.

Winnie became one of the zoo's most popular animals. Because she had been raised around soldiers, she was remarkably gentle. Children could feed her—and even ride on her back! Her favourite treat wasn't honey, but a sweet mix of corn syrup and condensed milk.



It was at the London Zoo that A. A. Milne and his young son Christopher Robin met Winnie. Christopher was so enchanted by her that he named his teddy bear after her. Milne combined that name with "Pooh," the name of a friend's pet swan, and thus Winnie-the-Pooh was born. The rest, as they say, is history.


Milne's books—*Winnie-the-Pooh* (1926) and *The House at Pooh Corner* (1928)—introduced the world to Pooh, Piglet, Eeyore, Kanga, Owl, Rabbit, and later, Tigger. The characters were inspired by Christopher Robin's own stuffed animals, and the books were beautifully illustrated by E. H. Shepard. Winnie even appeared in poetry collections like *When We Were Very Young* and *Now We Are Six*.

The gentle bear captured hearts across the globe. *Winnie-the-Pooh* was translated into many languages—including Latin—and became the first foreign-language book to make *The New York Times* Best Sellers list.

Harry Colebourn, meanwhile, served heroically during the war, rising to the rank of Captain. Although he visited Winnie whenever he could, he eventually decided the London Zoo was the best home for her. In 1919, he donated her permanently in gratitude for the care she received. Winnie lived at the zoo until her death in 1934.

After the war, Colebourn returned to Canada, opened a veterinary practice in Winnipeg, retired in 1945, and passed away in 1947. He is buried in Brookside Cemetery—leaving behind a legacy far greater than he could ever have imagined.

As we think about raising our children in a world filled with screens and distractions, there's something comforting about stories like *Winnie-the-Pooh*—simple, kind, and timeless. Maybe that's why Pooh still matters today. And maybe that's a reminder for all of us: sometimes, the simplest stories leave the deepest impressions.



The real-life Christopher Robin with Winnie; if you look closely you can see it's signed with the location, "The Zoo."




Christopher Robin's real-life stuffed animals that inspired *Winnie-the-Pooh*, Piglet, Tiger, Kanga and Eeyore.




